The Foundation did not escape these challenges as it had to cancel traditional activities and fund-raising events while remaining committed to its mission to support the school's entire learning community and provide services to achieve its mission of making a difference for all those who call Lake Park "home."

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MAKE A DONATION

32 Years of Serving Students and Teachers

Since 1989 the Foundation has been committed to meeting its mission to enhance student learning experiences while supporting the entire Lake Park learning community in its goal to achieve excellence. Throughout its years of serving the students and teachers of Lake Park High School, the Foundation has initiated programs, created partnerships with academic departments, supported teacher innovations, and provided resources to support District initiatives. The Foundation has been able to achieve success by tailoring its efforts in light of changing educational trends and to meet the evolving needs of those it seeks to serve.

The Foundation was able to reach a milestone in its giving efforts during the 2020-21 school year by surpassing **one-half million dollars** in support of Lake Park High School District 108 projects and programs that directly impact students, teachers, and the Lake Park community. None of this would have been possible without the dedicated support of Lake Park faculty, staff, community members, business partners, and those who have tirelessly volunteered their time and energy to assist the Foundation's various fund-raising programs.

This, however, is only a beginning as the Foundation continues to be actively committed to seeking additional ways to partner with Lake Park High School. The Foundation was no exception as it had to cancel or significantly alter many of its annual events and fund-raising activities due to State restrictions. Nevertheless, the Foundation remained committed to meeting its mission of enhancing student learning while supporting the entire Lake Park learning community as a partner in achieving educational excellence through the following programs.

Supporting Teacher Innovation – Funds For Excellence Grants

The Foundation established the Funds for Excellence Grant Program In 2005-06 to support teachers’ efforts in obtaining materials, equipment, and classroom resources to implement innovative ideas and instructional approaches that are beyond the means of the regular school district budget. Since the inception of this program, the Foundation has awarded 97 grants totaling over \$166,350 to support this critically important program.

ABOUT FUNDS FOR EXCELLENCE GRANTS

Assisting Those in Need - Emergency Need and Support Fund

The Foundation created an Emergency Need and Support Fund during the 2010-11 school year to provide support for school-related expenses for students facing financial hardship. In addition to providing free breakfast and lunch coupons for students in need who do not qualify for the federal free/reduced lunch program, the fund assists students from financially-challenged families with field trip, SAT prep class, and

Helping Students Achieve Their Dreams - The Scholarship Program

Meeting rising college tuition costs has traditionally been a challenge for students and families. The Foundation has assisted students and families by awarding over a **\$285,350** in scholarships to deserving students since 2005-06. In **2021** alone, the Foundation awarded **35** scholarships totaling **\$30,250** to students based on everything from financial need to academic performance, majors students are planning to pursue, leadership, and service to the school and community.

Expanding The Foundation’s Footprint – Partnerships

A longstanding goal of the Foundation has been to encourage and support school/community partnerships. Beginning with the Night of Fine Dining and the Memorial Garden project, the Foundation has looked for ways to collaborate with the District, a department, or a group to support a major initiative, to meet a specific goal, or to meet recurring expenses. The Foundation has been able to work collaboratively with members of the school community and the communities that serve Lake Park to benefit the school and its students by establishing the partnerships program. Following is an overview of the partnerships that have been established, when they began, and how they have made a difference for those who call Lake Park home.

Night of Fine Dining and Theatre — 2014

This annual event showcases the talents and the practical application of learning by Lake Park culinary arts students who prepare and serve a gourmet meal for attending community members. Additional support is provided by Art Club students who create decorations to enhance the event’s ambience, Jazz Band students who provide background music for diners, drama students who perform the school’s winter play, and Technology and Engineering students who create original products for the silent auction, which to date has raised over **\$42,000** to support various Foundation projects. This school-wide fund-raising event is also supported by various academic departments who have donated items for the silent auction. Facing COVID restrictions in 2020, the Foundation maintained the Night of Fine Dining by orchestrating a “drive-up” gourmet meal for community members in coordination with both the winter and spring student play productions.

A Faculty Member’s Perspective

“The Night of Fine Dining is a great learning experience for students. They benefit from the entire experience by gaining insight into how the hospitality industry works and what is involved in food production and planning for a major event. The amount of work students put in is extensive and those involved in food preparation and service benefit from the experience by enhancing their culinary skills. RYLA Partnership — 2015

To help foster the development of student leadership skills, the Foundation partnered with the East Campus administration to support student attendance at the annual Rotary Youth Leadership Awards program (RYLA). Thirty-seven students from diverse backgrounds with emerging leadership skills have participated in the program since the partnership began. The effectiveness of the RYLA experience is perhaps best expressed in the words of a recent RYLA participant:

“Attending the RYLA workshop was one of the best parts of my high school experience. The workshop taught me a great deal about my individual leadership style. We learned how to best lead a group based on personality and worked on developing communication and collaboration skills. I learned a great deal about the power of positivity and determination to succeed. My skills as a student leader grew.”

Memorial Gardens — 2015

The Foundation took a leadership role in creating a permanent memorial garden at the West Campus and enhancing the East Campus memorial garden in response to a group of students who wanted to honor a classmate who passed away in 2014. Working collaboratively with students, staff, community members, and the school district by spearheading financial support from these groups, the memorial garden concept came to fruition. Dedicated on May 30, 2015, the garden at each campus provides students, families, and friends of Lake Park with peaceful settings for solace and remembrance.

A Foundation Member's Perspective

"The Memorial Garden is an important collaboration effort between Lake Park High School and the Foundation for three reasons. First, it ties generations of Lake Park students and staff together. The trees and benches surrounding the West Campus garden and the commemorative bricks that form the garden walkway were donated in remembrance of a classmate, a loved one, a former Lake Park staff member, or a student who passed away in service to the country. The one thing that binds this diverse group of individuals together is that they are all part of the Lake Park family. Second, the student idea of a Memorial Garden, which came to fruition through the efforts of students, staff, and community members working together to raise funds to make a dream become reality, was the first school/community project the Foundation initiated and thus served as a model for subsequent partnerships. Finally, the Memorial Garden at each campus provides students, families, and friends of Lake Park with an enduring, dedicated place for reflection and remembrance."

Robotics Partnership — 2017

The Foundation established a partnership with Lake Park's Robotics Club with a goal to help develop the robotics program while supporting STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics) concepts and fostering lifelong skills of teamwork, leadership, communication, and computer programming. The Foundation provided financial support through the partnership to purchase VEX robotics components that enable students to build robots in order to compete in local, state, and national VEX robotics competitions. The benefit of this partnership is that students are given practical experience in applying STEM principles to creatively solve problems. A second benefit of the partnership is that participation in the Robotics Club has significantly grown and enrollments in Technology and Engineering classes has also increased. These student reflections exemplify the benefit of the robotics partnership:

"By participating in the Robotics Club, I have learned so much about programming, mechanics, and the real-world application of physics and electronics."

"I benefitted in many ways from being in the robotics program. I learned a lot about engineering and how to build a robot to accomplish a task. I also learned what it takes to be a team leader and the communication it takes to get things done."

"The robotics program has heightened my interest in engineering. It has given me the practical skills to build and design real-life machines."

"The Educational Foundation has played a pivotal role in the Robotics Club program. With the Foundation's support, the Robotics Club has grown from 6 to 40 students and has allowed us to acquire the materials and technology to build competitive robots. Through the support of the Foundation, we have not only been able to teach robotics at a more sophisticated level, but have been able to grow our program to one of the best in the State.

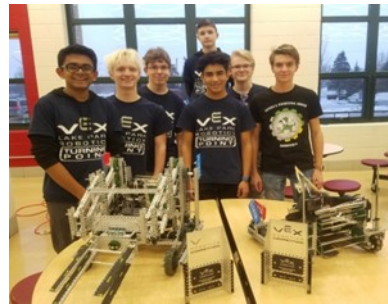
The partnership with the Foundation has also directly impacted the Technology and Engineering Department. Students enroll in Project Lead the Way engineering classes to build on skills learned in the Robotics Club. Students from the club also become interested in the department's machining program where they learn how to design and build custom metal parts.

Another benefit of the partnership is that it has allowed us to develop sponsorships with and support from local companies."

ABOUT VEX ROBOTICS

Gateways Program — 2017

The Foundation partnered with the school's Transition Assistance Program (TAP) to create the Gateways Program to support special education students following the completion of four academic years of high school. The purpose of the Gateways Program is to create opportunities for special education students to participate in coordinated activities that provide them with functional life skills and vocational instruction to bridge the gap between school and adult life and to support their post-secondary goals. To achieve this end, the Foundation supports vocational training as well as providing materials and resources to support the development of functioning and organizational skills for these students. A major component of this partnership is the Lake Bark Café, a student-centered entrepreneurial project to promote community involvement, teamwork, planning, time management, and self-advocacy skills.

A Faculty Member's Perspective

"The Gateways Program has benefitted students in a number of ways, such as covering post-secondary education-related fees, costs associated with obtaining training certifications, registration fees for workshops and classes, and costs for academic supplies and independent living needs.

Specifically, the partnership has helped increase a student's social interactions through the purchase of a watch that serves as a communications device. It provided the opportunity for another student with financial need to enroll in a theater class through a special education cooperative. Finally, a bicycle was donated to serve as a student's primary mode of transportation to and from work when a community member heard about Gateways via the Foundation."

INCubator Program — 2019

The Foundation established a partnership with Lake Park's Business Education Department to serve as the fiscal agent for the newly launched INCubator program. As part and parcel of this partnership, the Foundation provided seed money to assist in launching the program as well as facilitated philanthropic support for the program. This innovative program has students engage in hands-on entrepreneurial learning by developing a business of their own. As students work in teams to develop their products, their learning experience is enhanced by local business professionals who serve as mentors and classroom coaches. The program experience culminates in a "Pitch Night" event where students present their business plan in a "shark tank" style competition with winning projects receiving scholarships from INCubator donors.

"The greatest lessons learned as students participate in the INCubator program are that they need to collaborate, cooperate, and develop ideas that can turn into real products. As a very hands-on class, INCubator stands out as a learning opportunity because we have four different individuals/groups that work together to help students develop the knowledge and skills to be successful. The teacher, content area coaches that present to the students, mentors that work weekly with each of the groups, and our three-member Board of Directors provide valuable feedback to groups and work seamlessly as a team to help students learn and achieve their team goals. 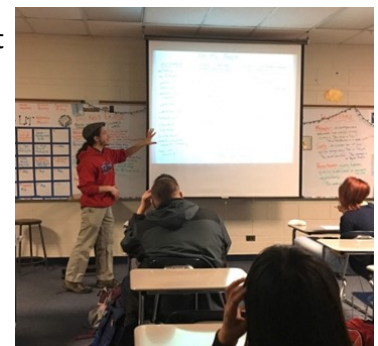
Poetry Workshop — 2021

Since 2017, the Foundation has provided financial assistance to obtain the services of poet Adam Gottlieb to guide all students in the freshman English program as they develop a semester capstone assessment through the art of performance poetry. Mr. Gottlieb mentors students through the entire process as they author, revise, practice, and perfect the delivery of poems that explore who they are, what they value, and what they hope to achieve. The 2021 Foundation partnership ensures Foundation financial support for continuing this innovative program that has proven to be a powerful personal growth experience for students while building strong classroom communities through inclusion, connection, and empathy. The Poetry Workshop's impact can be seen in these sample student reflections:

"By participating in the Poetry Workshop, I felt more creatively empowered than ever before. The class felt like a safe place for me to express my feelings with openness and challenged me to think critically as a young adult."

"The capstone assessment, while nerve racking, allowed me to dig deep and write something meaningful to me which felt good."

"The experience of writing a poem and presenting it to the class gave me the opportunity to step out of my comfort zone in front of my peers. It really helped me look at myself and see who I am and to see that in some of my classmates as well."

"Through the poetry workshop, students learn the value of their own voice, as they are given a supportive and constructive platform to both showcase their creativity and share a meaningful aspect of their identity. Students also learn the value of empathy. Additionally, through the workshops and final performances, students share components of their identity that are meaningful with their peers, allowing for genuine relationships and community building. Due to the personal nature of the work, students remember this experience for years to come, and they walk away filled with pride at what they accomplished."

My students' performances left me speechless, in tears, and inexplicably proud of their courage."

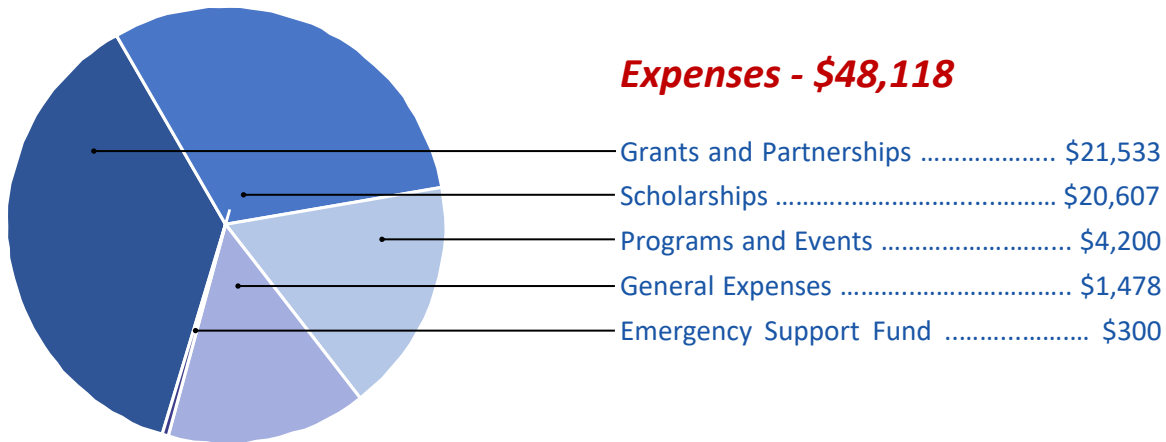
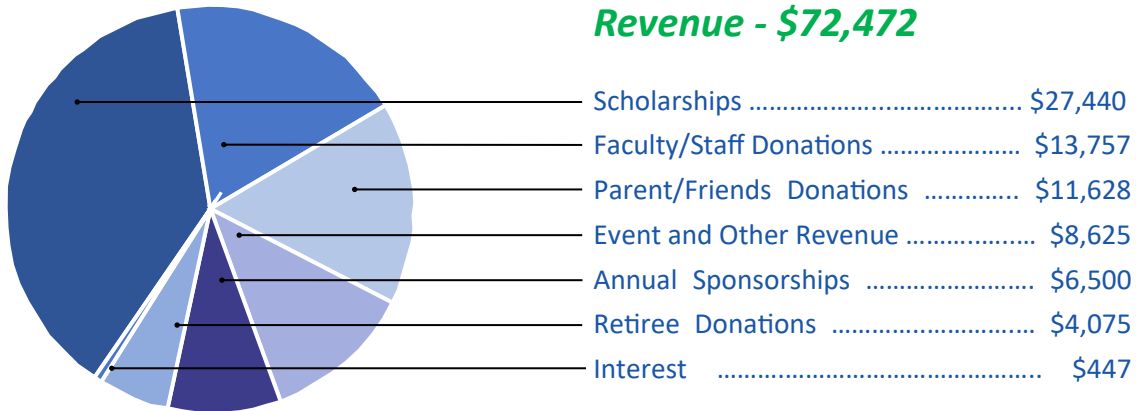
